NYS D.E.C. FREE FISHING DAYS

In New York State, anyone 16 years of age or older must obtain a fishing license in order to legally fish. The DEC, however, has designated 2 days to fish **without a license**. Free Fishing Days are **Saturday and Sunday, June 29th & 30th**. Have fun!

DOG LICENSING and TOWN CODE

All dogs, 4 months or older, owned by a resident of New York, that are harbored in the Town of Rush for at least 15 days must be licensed. Licensing of your dog requires proof of a current rabies vaccination. All documentation of spayed/neutered information must be presented at the time of licensing.

Please remember that all dogs must be accompanied by their owner or a responsible person under the full control of such owner or on a leash affixed to the dog's collar. Other useful information regarding dog control can be found in the Town Code on line at www.townofrush.com.

ZONING & PLANNING BOARD APPLICATIONS

Many of you have inquired about the **outcomes** of Planning Board (PB) and Zoning Board of Appeals (ZBA) **applications**. Because the town newsletters are published bi-monthly, the ZBA and PB agenda items sometimes become "old" news. So that you may be informed, (as a town courtesy and not a legal obligation) we send out a notice of meeting to all residents within 500 feet of parcels being discussed. Depending on deadlines, all public hearing notices are published in the Sentinel and/or the Henrietta Post. All of the meeting agendas, minutes, and applications and decisions are posted on the town website at www.townofrush.com. Below is a brief synopsis of most recently heard applications before the PB and ZBA.

Monroe County has chosen a very aggressive approach towards Ash trees within their ROW (right of way) due to the invasion of the Emerald Ash

Bore. The plan is to cut down every identified Ash tree, without concern for its condition, when the road is due for maintenance. If you have a stately Ash tree in your yard that is healthy and within the Monroe County ROW contact Monroe County DOT and tell them how you feel. I believe this is overkill, and we will only be taking down Ash trees on Town roads when they pose a problem, are dead, or show signs of distress.

The Highway Department contracts with Monroe County to perform road construction and general maintenance on County roads. These agreements bring revenue back to the Town helping to offset the budget. The county roads in Town to be worked on this year include: Honeoye Falls #6 Road Nova Chip paving between Rt.15A to just east of Works Road intersection and Woodruff Rd. for asphalt prep work and tree trimming.

The Town's portion of the Pinnacle Road Capital Project has been completed. It included demolition of an old poured in place concrete cross culvert and installation of a new 18" poly pipe along with some tree removal and grubbing. Ramsey Construction was awarded the main portion of the bid and will be installing new under drainage, 5' paved shoulders and a pavement overlay. Through traffic will be maintained for the duration of the project but an alternative route is recommended if possible; completion date is October.

Town road projects this summer will include Keyes Road cold mix paving, which will be done in part with C.H.I.P.S, (Consolidated Local Street and Highway Improvement Program) funding. Wardell, Honeoye Falls 5 Points Road (east section) and Stull Roads will be surface treated. Other Town roads will also be receiving prep work and/or spot repairs, as well as drainage and tree trimming.

A seventy-five million dollar state wide increase in C.H.I.P.S. funding was approved and passed in the NYS 2013 budget. This is the first increase over the past 5 years, and will mean approximately \$11,000 in additional funding directly to the Town. I would like to thank both Senator Ted O'Brien and Assemblyman Bill Nojay for hearing and supporting our local highway funding concerns. Monroe County also benefits from the CHIPS increase, and as subcontractors for the county we have picked up additional revenues from county projects that would not have been available without the funding increase.

SWIMMING POOLS

Even with the cool temperatures we have had it is not too early to think about the things we can do to ensure our swimming pools are a safe place for our family and friends to enjoy during the upcoming warm weather.

Please ensure the following safe practices are in place during the summer season:

- Practice constant adult supervision around any body of water. Drowning is a leading cause of death to children under five.
- All pools must be surrounded by a fence at least four feet high except for above ground pools with a wall height of 48". All gates must be self closing and self latching.
- A spot on the wall or the fence should be used to hold a life saving device or phone.
- Steps and ladders for above ground pools should be secured or removed when the pool is not in use.
- Use a cover for the pool when it is not in use.
- Install a pool alarm
- Keep steps, sidewalks and patios in good repair
- A permit is required for ANY pool that can hold 24" or more of water.

HOUSE NUMBERS

I continue to hear that many house numbers are not visible from the street. We should make sure our house numbers are easily seen by emergency responders should we ever need them.

Be informed that the Rush Town Code, Chapter 40, Numbering of Buildings, lists these requirements:

- Numbers shall be displayed in Arabic font.
- Minimum height of the numbers shall be 4 inches.
- Numbers must be secured to the "front wall, front porch, or a post in the front yard".
- Numbers can also be displayed near the main entrance or travel way (sidewalk or driveway) leading to the entry door.
- The numbers must be secured at least 4 feet high and no more than 10 feet high.
- The color of the numbers must contrast with the surface color the numbers are secured to so they are easily seen from the street during daylight.

In my last newsletter I shared with you that I had received an inquiry concerning whether Rush might have had a newspaper back in the mid 1800's. I was unable to find any record of one in the History room, but after many phone calls and considerable searching, I was able to find copies of the *Rush Echo*, a newspaper published monthly from December 1879-November 1881.

The copies had been donated by Ken Darron in 1972. The *Rush Echo* sold for a nickel a copy. It contains a section on current events in Rush, such as: who got kicked by his horse, who was having visitors and what play was coming to Town. It is exciting to read about what was going on in the lives of many of the people who were the pioneers of Rush.

Fortunately Mrs. Jan Darron has the originals and has loaned them to the Library to be scanned. Once this is accomplished, within a few months these treasured newspapers will be made part of the *Historical Newspapers of the Rochester, New York Region*, (an online collection of historical newspapers from the service area of the Rochester Regional Library Council-RRLC).

Having the *Rush Echo* available on the Historical Newspapers' website will mean the content will be preserved forever. You will be able to go online and read the entire newspaper, issue by issue.

Many thanks to Jan Darron for her generosity in sharing these treasured historical documents. Thanks also to Sue Mee, who is the Global Education Librarian at RIT, who is instrumental in placing the *Rush Echo* in the online collection of newspapers, and also to the Rush Library staff for scanning all the necessary documents.

On July 8th at 7:00 PM at the Town Pavilion, Jeanne Yawman will be discussing her new book *Homestead Heritage*, which is about her family, and includes many tales about early Rush, along with humorous anecdotes. Selden Chase, (Rush's own "Will Rogers") will also be there to share some of his many stories.

Jeanne will be selling & signing her book. Jeanne authored "The Road to Yesterday" when she was the Rush Historian (a book I refer to often) and I will have copies of it also available for sale. Space is limited, so please register in advance by calling the Rush Library at 533-1370.

As I informed you in the last Newsletter, former Rush Historian Bessie Hallock's book "Here on this Hilltop" sold out. In May I received a second printing; there are only 25 copies of the second printing left. The book is available at the Town Clerk's office or the Library for a fee of \$11.00.

A Monroe County Update from Legislator Karla Boyce

Many things have happened in the County Legislature since the beginning of the year. One piece of Legislation that I am really proud to have supported was a local law, which prohibits the sale, use and possession of

synthetic drug compounds in Monroe County.

While synthetic drugs such as bath salts are a relatively new phenomenon in our society, they have been making headlines across the country because of its dangerous side effects. Due to its easy availability and marketing styles, the youth in

our community have become very susceptible to its use. One of the most alarming facts is that the majority of synthetic drug users are high school students and older teens. A survey conducted in 2011 found that 11.4% of 12th graders used synthetic drugs during the past year, making it the second most commonly used illicit drug among seniors in high schools.

For some time, the makers of synthetic drugs have been able to circumvent laws by slightly changing the chemical structure of the drug. The Republican Majority's enacted law, attacks the chemical structure of synthetic drugs by not only outlawing the compounds used for manufacturing synthetic drugs, but also any structural analogs and chemical derivatives. By passing this law the Monroe County Legislature has sent a clear message that the sale, use or possession of these illicit substances will not be tolerated in Monroe County. I am proud to have supported this local law which is one step closer in the right direction of cracking down on these harmful drugs which have infiltrated our community.

Rush Echo Newspaper: Our little town published its own newspaper, *The Rush Echo*, from December, 1879 through December, 1881 and it's a fascinating look back in time. Thanks to a generous loan by Janice Darron of her original newspapers, we have been able to digitize the newspaper here at the library, and *The Echo* will soon be included on the website, *Historical Newspapers of the Rochester, New York Region* (<http://rrlcnewspapers.org/>.) This site is a project of the Rochester Regional Library Council and is chartered by the New York State Board of Regents; it allows users to search old local newspapers electronically for historical content, images, or genealogical pursuits; you could perform a search by a relative's name, for instance. In addition, we will be pursuing the creation of a *Rush Echo* book for you to peruse in the near future. My thanks to staff member, Sue Beattie, for all her help with the digitizing process!

V.I.P. Museum Passes: For your summer "staycations", check out a museum pass to Genesee Country Village, Memorial Art Gallery, George Eastman House, Rochester Museum & Science Center, or Geva Theatre. FIRE DISTRICT

YOUR TAX RATE: It is time for us to start to prepare a 2014 budget. It is our goal to keep the rate the same as the few past years. At this time you pay \$1.10 per thousand. Our costs continue to go up and we try to save money any place we can. We have two major reserve funds, one for building and grounds and the other for apparatus and major equipment such as the radio system replacement and new vehicles.

A new quick response pumper is being built and will cost \$430,000. We have more than enough money in the Equipment reserve replacement fund for this purchase. We plan on front driveway apron major repair and expansion at station one in 2013.

FIRE RESPONSE: Our box system that was put into place early this year is working out very well. Neighboring fire department apparatus and firefighters respond at the same time we are dispatched by 911. This is for Type A Fire situations. These are mainly structure fires or fire in a structure. We are very fortunate to only have used this system one time in 6 months in Rush.

We have responded several times to our neighbors. When we do have a serious fire we want a quick response with enough people to make a rescue and save property without having to wait to get one of our officers or members on the scene and then call for mutual aid help. Almost all the volunteer FDs are in the same situation of very little help in the first few minutes of the fire and this includes most of our neighbors. We are providing the same service for them when needed.

NEW PUMPER 585: Five members of the new truck committee went to Meyersdale, PA to the factory to meet with the head engineer of 4-Guys Fire Apparatus. He had some suggestions that would lower the cost and make the vehicle more efficient. We will be asking the voters in the Rush

Fire District to be allowed to purchase this truck and a thermal imaging camera using money we have in the bank. If approved we should have the new truck in early spring of 2014.

FIRE DEPARTMENT AND AMBULANCE ANNUAL REPORT

ANNUAL FUND DRIVE: All resident should have received a fund drive request for Ambulance and Fire Department operations. A special "thank you" goes out to all of the residents that contributed to our annual fund drive. We realize that the economy is having an adverse effect on many. Your firefighters appreciate the Rush community financial support that is unmatched per mailing anywhere in western New York! No fund drive money is used for any social events.

Fund drive money goes for training, fire prevention activities, scouting programs, new equipment and vehicles such as a new rescue truck in 2010 and a new ambulance in 2012.

We just put into service a new Kubota 4x4 with trailer that cost \$15,000. This was completely paid for with Fund Drive money. The old ATV was sold for \$1,580. Along with the Fire District we will be upgrading our Automatic Defibrillators also in 2013. We plan on upgrading our utility/brush truck to a four person cab in the near future.

DOG SHOW: Genesee Valley Kennel Club will be using our Carnival field and south area parking lots June 20th, 21st and 22nd during the day till around 6 PM. The RFD Ladies Auxiliary will be operating the food concession and providing meals during that period.
